Abstract

The research here proposed, aims to bring a new look into inequality with emphasis on

the primary distribution of income, which is generated by the productive structure of a

country. In the context of the current discussions proposed by ECLAC, regarding

structural change for equality, it is relevant to analyze the Uruguayan case in order to

submit evidence for the Latin American discussion. Specifically, the recent reduction in

inequality and its possible link with the productive transformation that has begun in

Uruguay. The period of analysis is between 1998 and 2012 that means the latest economic

cycle in Uruguay.

This research will be made within the framework of Latin American structuralism theory;

income distribution will be used as a proxy of inequality, and its link with productive

structure will be observed in the labor market, as the characteristics of labor demand

impacts on wage inequality. Differences among primary income distribution between

economic sectors will be studied throw a parametric decomposition method.

It is expected to contribute to the discussion of structural change in Uruguay and its link

with the recent drop in inequality throw the generation of new empirical evidence,

including an Economic History perspective.
