# **Comparative Political Behavior: Elections in Latin America**

# Descripción y objetivos

Elections are a central trait of Latin America politics. They are an essential aspect of democratic governance in the region and have become increasingly polemic, with contested results and questions about their integrity. Still, all countries in the region, even those who have questionable elections, rely on them as the main source of regime legitimacy. In 2025 eight countries will hold elections, same number that held them in 2024. Hence, understanding how voters choose candidates in elections becomes fundamental in the study of political science in the region.

This class proposes two things. First, we will explore the main explanations of vote choice, focusing specifically on the comparative literature that turns its attention to the Latin American voter. This literature is in close debate with studies that were implemented and designed focusing on the United States. Hence, even though we won't read about the latter case directly, references to the North American literature will be frequent.

Second, we will explore the details and context of elections in each of the countries that held them in 2024 and will hold in 2025 – including general and local elections. These comprise Mexico, Brazil, Venezuela, Uruguay, El Salvador, Dominican Republic, Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Ecuador and Honduras.

In each class we will spend two hours discussing a specific theoretical explanation for vote choice based on a lecture by the professor and student participation relying on assigned readings. The last hour of the session will be dedicated to the analysis of individual countries, with students presenting a detailed description and summary of the countries' electoral context including electoral rules, political parties, political leaders, issues, social cleavages and poll or election results. Presentations will either be in groups or by individuals, depending on enrolment, and each presentation will be based on research conducted by the presenters.





#### Evaluación

Grades will be based on a final paper, class participation and a seminar presentation with the following distribution:

20% for class participation, including following the readings, actively participating in debates and proposing topics and questions for discussion;

40% for in-class presentation of one of the cases, which will be defined in the first day of class; 40% for final paper on a different case, using some of the theoretical approaches discussed.
